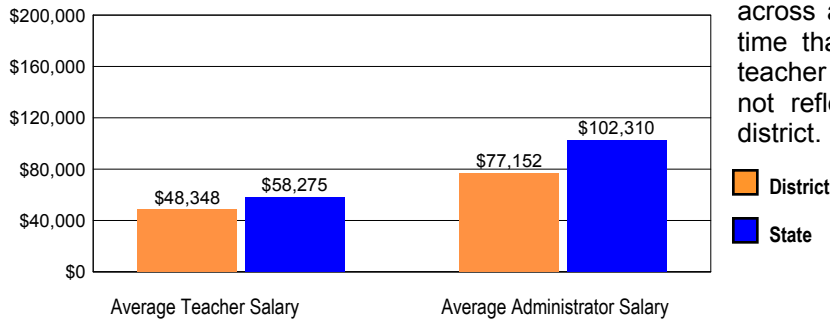

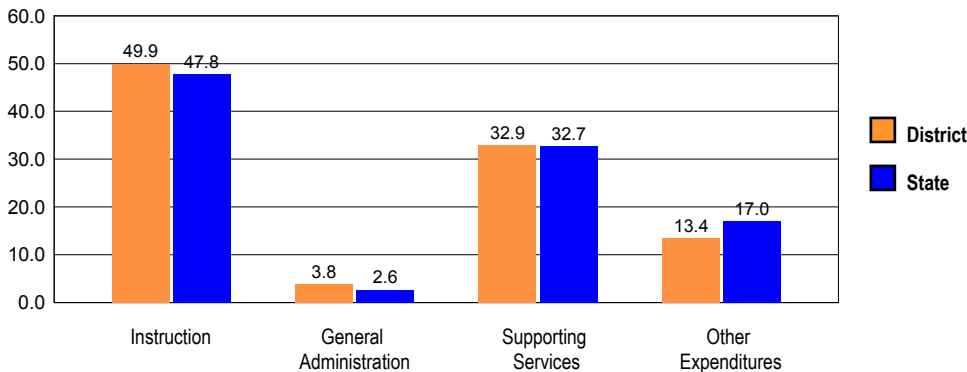
SCHOOL DISTRICT FINANCES

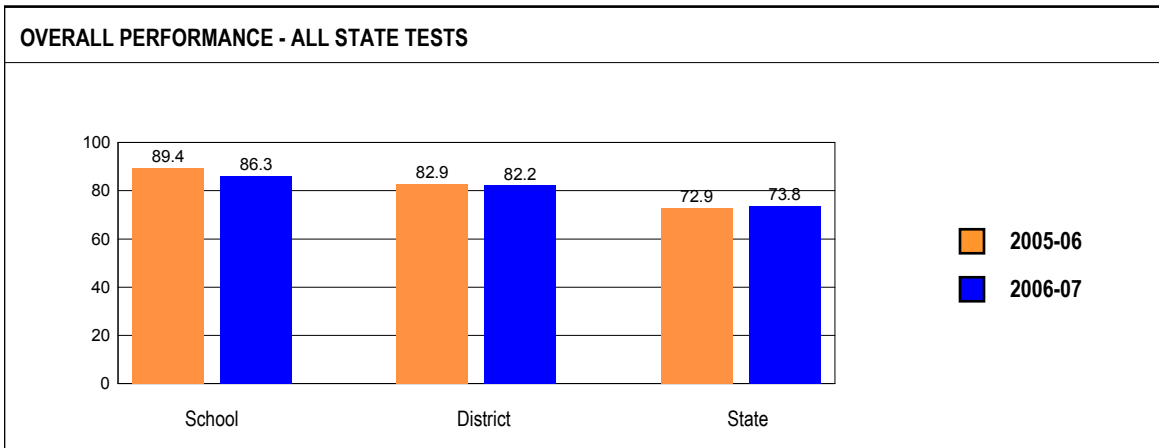

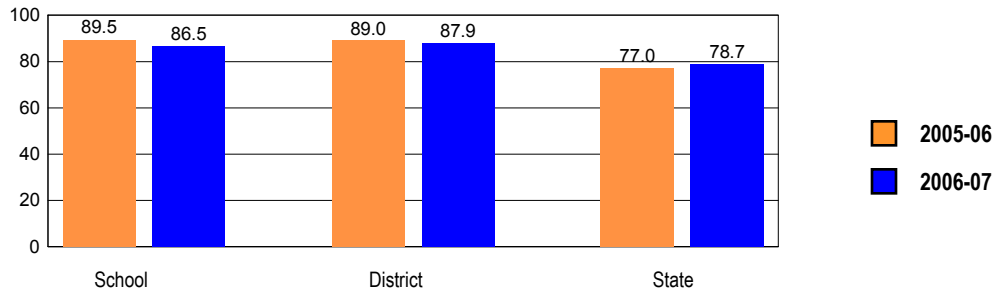

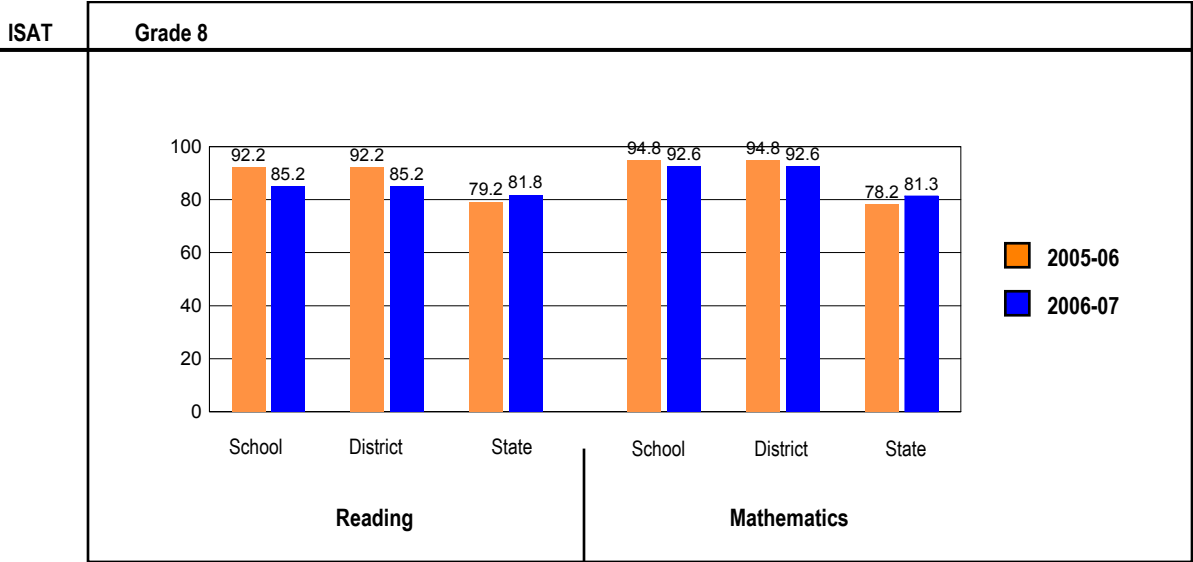
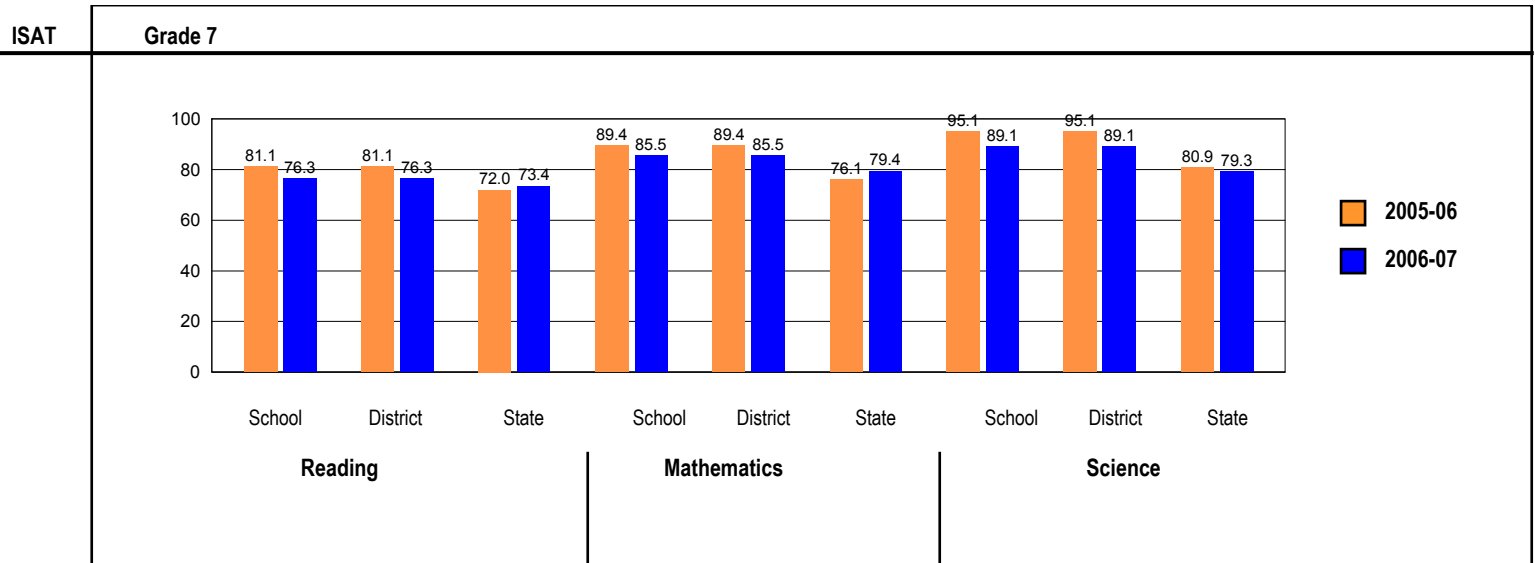
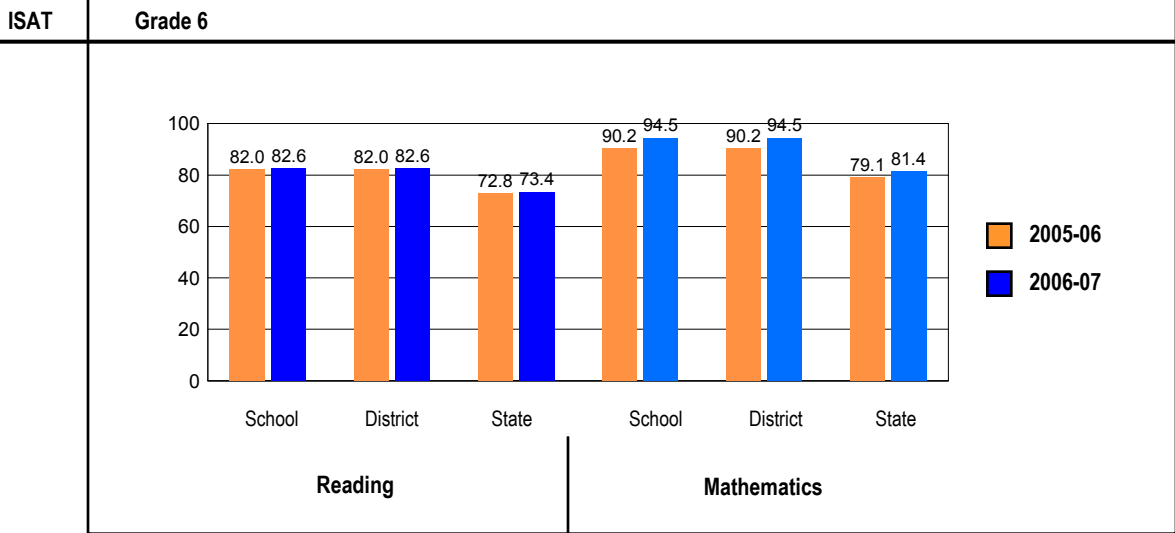


OVERALL ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT) PERFORMANCE



ISAT PERFORMANCE

PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS

Federal law requires that student achievement results for reading, mathematics and science for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3 through 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Measure of Annual Growth in English (IMAGE) is administered to limited-English-proficient students. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP (No Child Left Behind Act). An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT)

The following tables show the percentages of student scores in each of four performance levels. These levels were established with the help of Illinois educators who teach the grade levels and learning areas tested. Due to rounding, the sum of the percentages in the four performance levels may not always equal 100.

- Level 1 -- Academic Warning - Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.
- Level 2 -- Below Standards - Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.
- Level 3 -- Meets Standards - Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.
- Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards - Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

Four Conditions Are Required For Making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP):

1. At least 95% tested in reading and mathematics for every student group. If the current year participation rate is less than 95%, this condition may be met if the average of the current and preceding year rates is at least 95%, or if the average of the current and two preceding years is at least 95%. Only actual participation rates are printed. If the participation rate printed is less than 95% and yet this school makes AYP, it means that the 95% condition was met by averaging.
2. At least 55.0% meeting/exceeding standards in reading and mathematics for every group. For any group with less than 55.0% meeting/exceeding standards, a 95% confidence interval was applied. Subgroups may meet this condition through Safe Harbor provisions. ***
3. For schools not making AYP solely because the IEP group fails to have 55.0% meeting/exceeding standards, 14% may be added to this variable in accordance with the federal 2% flexibility provision.
4. At least 90% attendance rate for non-high schools and at least 72% graduation rate for high schools.

In order for Safe Harbor to apply, a subgroup must decrease by 10% the percentage of scores that did not meet state standards from the previous year plus meet the other indicators (attendance rate for non-high schools and graduation rate for high schools) for the subgroup. For subgroups that do not meet their Safe Harbor Targets, a 75% confidence interval is applied. Safe Harbor allows schools an alternate method to meet subgroup minimum targets on achievement.

Winnebago Middle School – School Improvement Plan

Winnebago Middle School professional staff and students take tremendous pride in the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) scores of March 2007. Additionally, our Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) assessments from the 2006-07 school year are also impressive. These scores reflect the quality of the school educators and the desire of the students to excel and achieve. WMS will continue to challenge students with high expectations for its professional staff and students.

During the past summer and early this school year the School Improvement Committee reviewed MAP and ISAT data. This review indicates improvement is needed in the areas of reading skills. Our school's reading goals are:

1. At each grade level on the MAP assessment the skill area of Reading Strategies/Comprehension will have a mean RIT score equal to or greater than the RIT mean for the overall Reading.
2. At each grade level WMS will exceed the NCLB Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). Our target goal is 85% in Reading on the ISAT.

MAP and ISAT scores for mathematics indicate an improvement is needed in certain areas. The following goals reflect the areas that will be addressed.

1. At each grade level on the MAP assessment the skill area of Geometry will have a mean RIT score equal to or greater than the RIT mean for the overall Mathematics.
2. At each grade level on the MAP assessment the skill area of Measurement will have a mean RIT score equal to or greater than the RIT mean for the overall Mathematics.
3. At each grade level WMS will exceed the NCLB AYP. Our target goal is 90% in Mathematics on the ISAT.

The School Improvement Committee has also established other goals that focus upon improving our school. One goal is to provide to parents a weekly communication of classroom activities and expectations. These goals are:

1. By the end of the 2007-08 school year 100% of the teachers will use technology to post weekly information on classroom activities.
2. By the end of the 2nd quarter of the 2007-08 school year 100% of the parents will be provided an opportunity to attend training sessions on accessing their child's school related information via the Internet.

The School Improvement Committee determined that another area of focus is improving students' writing skills. For this school year the goals are:

1. Train two Language Arts teachers on the ISAT writing process.
2. Language Arts teachers who were trained will train 100% of the remaining Language Arts teachers on the ISAT writing process. Teachers will then instruct students on this process.

WMS educators will continue to review the curriculum and how our school is organized to ensure it meets the intellectual, social, and emotional needs of young adolescents. Recommendations for revisions will reflect these needs, while following the professional views of experts in the field of middle school education.
